

BACHELOR OF SOCIAL WORK

The Bachelor of Social Work (B.S.W.) program at Texas Woman's University was founded in 1946 and was one of the first accredited programs in the state. The B.S.W. provides generalist social work education, including professionally supervised training in agencies as preparation for social work licensure, social work practice, and/or graduate school. The goal of the B.S.W. program is to prepare students to practice effectively with diverse client systems of all sizes, to focus on the structural causes and consequences of social, environmental, and economic injustice, and to equip students with the knowledge and skills to effect positive change. In addition, the program aims to produce graduates with an educational foundation in women's issues who will incorporate social work values and ethics into their professional practice with a strong commitment to the empowerment of marginalized, underserved, and at-risk populations.

Social work career possibilities include geriatrics, mental health, medical social work, community organizer, child protective services, children and family, social service administration, school social work, case management, policy development, program evaluation, emergency services, adult protective services, work with adolescents, and a host of other areas.

The curriculum is organized around six areas of study: practice, human behavior, and the social environment, social welfare and social policy, research, professional development, and field education. Content on values and ethics, diversity, populations at risk, and social, economic, and environmental justice are infused throughout the curriculum. Students are provided with field experience by means of a 416-semester credit hour (minimum) block placement in social service agencies, under the direct supervision of a qualified social worker.

In addition to the University core curriculum requirements, the B.S.W. degree requires a total of 120 semester credit hours with 52 semester credit hours in Social Work. Departmental requirements include SPCH 1013, PSY 1013, SOCI 1013 or SOCI 1023, WS 2013, and SOWK 4903. A grade of C or higher must be earned in all required social work and all department requirement courses while maintaining a minimum overall GPA of 2.50. The student may select, with help from the academic advisor, electives complementary to career goals and interests. Students earning the B.S.W. degree at TWU are eligible to apply for state social work licensure and qualify for advanced standing in most M.S.W. program.

Marketable Skills

Defined by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board's 60x30 Strategic Plan (<http://www.60x30tx.com/>) as, "Those skills valued by employers that can be applied in a variety of work settings, including interpersonal, cognitive, and applied skills areas. These skills can be either primary or complementary to a major and are acquired by students through education, including curricular, co-curricular, and extracurricular activities."

1. Advance human rights and social, economic, and environmental justice.
2. Apply critical thinking to inform and communicate professional judgment.

3. Assess, Intervene, and evaluate practice with individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities.
4. Engage in practice-informed research and research-informed practice.
5. Synthesize and apply an array of theoretical perspectives.

Admissions

All applicants must meet the general undergraduate admission requirements (<http://catalog.twu.edu/undergraduate/admission-information/>).

All students interested in majoring in social work are encouraged to apply. Students must complete the following steps, prior to being admitted into the undergraduate social work program.

1. Apply to TWU (<http://catalog.twu.edu/undergraduate/admission-information/>). Go to ApplyTexas and select Bachelor of Social Work as your declared major. If you have already been accepted to TWU and would like to change your major to social work, please complete a Change of Major Form and have the social work program director sign the form.
2. Attend a scheduled social work program orientation. Orientations are held periodically during the fall and spring semesters. During orientation, students will sign a statement indicating awareness of and adherence to the NASW Code of Ethics and other program requirements. You will also provide your TWU ID number so that the social work program academic advisor can evaluate your GPA and completed semester credit hours. Please note, students must be **core complete or close to core complete and have a 2.5 cumulative GPA in order to start social work courses**.
3. Meet with the social work program academic advisor. The Academic advisor will schedule an appointment to meet with you to discuss your status. During the advisement appointment, the academic advisor will provide first-semester registration codes for students who are eligible to start courses. Students who are not eligible to start social work courses will be advised on the specific courses they need to take in order to become eligible. Students will also be provided a projected semester start date.
4. Complete and submit a social work program application. Students will officially apply to the social work program in SOWK 3513, midway through the semester. You will be able to access the application via your SOWK 3513 Canvas shell. This application should reflect a student's professional readiness and emotional suitability for social work practice education. Such qualifications include a service orientation to others, tolerance of diversity, an inclination toward participation in the promotion of social, economic, and environmental justice, respect for conditions of human need, professionalism, and leadership.
5. Receive an email from the social work program director. After the Admissions Committee has reviewed your application, you will receive an email from the program director detailing the admissions decision. The admissions committee (comprised of social work program faculty and staff) will rule in one of three ways:
 - Unconditional acceptance to the social work program – A student satisfies both academic and non-academic guidelines. An adviser is assigned and the student is informed of the need to meet with the adviser.
 - Conditional acceptance to the social work program – A student is found to have deficiencies that are considered needing remediation in either academic or non-academic areas.

Conditional admission contracts are developed with both the faculty and the student.

- Denied admission – A student is found to have deficiencies that are considered being beyond immediate remediation in either academic or non-academic areas.

Recommended Plan of Study

Special note: The first two years of study are comprised of general electives and core courses. Students may take these courses in any sequence. Beginning in year three, students begin the Social Work sequence as part of a cohort and progress through the program as a cohort. Social Work courses are rigidly sequenced. Students must complete all courses in a semester before beginning any courses in the next semester. Formal applications for admission to the Social Work Program are submitted during the first semester of social work courses.
